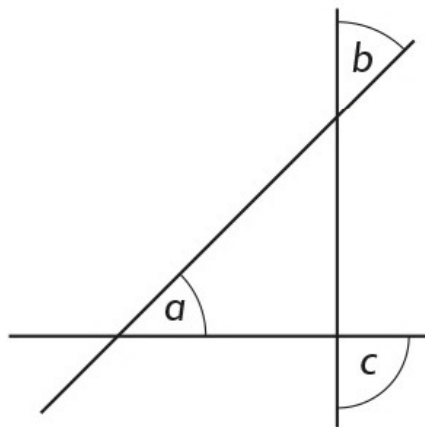

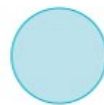

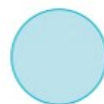

Q	Mark scheme for Grammar and Punctuation Test 1	Marks
1	Award 1 mark for one box ticked correctly: 'Despite the fierce heat, we made our way to the beach and set up camp.' Grammar essentials: 'Despite the fierce heat' is a fronted adverbial and is followed by a comma to separate it from the main clause.	1
2	Award 1 mark if 'gratefully' is underlined. Grammar essentials: An adverb can tell you more about a verb. It can say how something happens. Remember that not all adverbs end in 'ly' and not all words ending in 'ly' are adverbs!	1
3	Award 1 mark if 'fragile' and 'delicate' are circled. Grammar essentials: A synonym is a word that means the same or almost the same as another word.	1
4	Award 1 mark for both commas correctly placed: 'I always keep a pencil, a ruler, some pens and a sharpener in my pencil case.' Punctuation essentials: Commas can be used to separate items in a list (but not before 'and').	1
5	Award 1 mark for all four rows ticked correctly in this order: question, command, exclamation, statement. Grammar and punctuation essentials: A question is a sentence that asks something and ends with a question mark. A command is a sentence that tells you to do something and can end with a full stop or an exclamation mark. An exclamation sentence starts with 'What' or 'How', contains a verb and ends with an exclamation mark. A statement is a sentence that tells you something and usually ends with a full stop.	1
6	Award 1 mark if 'What a lovely dog you have' is ticked. Punctuation essentials: The third sentence is a statement which can end in a full stop or an exclamation mark. The other two sentences are questions so cannot end with a question mark.	1
7	Award 1 mark if 'There's bad weather forecast for the weekend.' is ticked. Grammar essentials: In Standard English, correct grammar is used. The contraction 'There's' is correct grammar. The other sentences use incorrect verb forms/grammar.	1
8	Award 1 mark if 'ours' is circled. Grammar essentials: A possessive pronoun replaces a person or thing that belongs to someone or something.	1
9	Award 1 mark for 'adequately' and 'tropical', if spelled correctly. Grammar essentials: A suffix is a letter or string of letters added to the end of a word to turn it into another word.	1
10	Award 1 mark for 'In the second sentence, the Smiths are not definitely moving house next year (but in the first they are)' or similar. Grammar essentials: A modal verb, for example: 'may', shows how certain something is.	1
11	Award 1 mark if 'My friend' is underlined. Also accept 'friend'. Grammar essentials: The subject of a sentence is the person, place or thing that is doing or being something; in English, it usually comes before the verb in the sentence.	1
12	Award 1 mark if 'have been' is ticked. Grammar essentials: The present perfect tense describes something that began in the past but may still continue into the present. It is formed from the present tense of 'have' and the past participle of the main verb.	1
